were framed, they remain impotent in protecting the environment as vested inter-ests 'purchasing the laws' Purushottam Reddy said, pointing at officials for one reason or other remaining silent against violations.

While the selfish politicians stopped bothering about fast depletion of natural resources and increasing environmental pollution, he said that 'the wealth of the plains depends on the health of the mountains'.

Retired DFO Tulasi Rao who played a key role in the development of Tiger Sanctuary in the Nallamala forests, said the 30 per cent of the forests of Eastern Chats were eroded. He stressed on peoples' partici-

pation to check smuggling and poaching to preserve the trees and animal wealth. GrACE (Green Alliance for Conservation of Eastern Chats) president Leela Lakshma Reddy said that the Tirupati conference which was the fifth such regional-level meet aimed at bringing various NGOs as well as the environmentalists together to build up area-wise campaigns to press the government to evolve a policy for protection of Eastern Ghats. Apart from building up the campaign for a policy change for protection of Eastern Ghats, the GrACE also took up a massive tree plantation programme in which so far about 23 lakh saplings involving as many as 18,000 school and college students in Andhra Pradesh and Telangana, planted to improve green cover.

Earlier, a students rally was taken out from Govindaraja Swamy temple to SV University where the meet was held.
